


The Wayfinder Experience




- The school is viewed as the source of knowledge, passing that knowledge down in a rigid process that ignores individual needs.
- The school is responsible for all instruction.
- School creates a uniform graduation track for students that remains the same regardless of student interests or needs.
- School selects a curriculum which guides teachers and classroom experience even if that experience is not meeting student needs.
- Religion is taught as a class and graded.
- School chooses extracurricular activities based on school-centered goals.




- The school is viewed as a community that operates through teamwork. Parents, teachers, and students are partners in the planning process.
- The school partners with the community to give students real-world experience.
- Students, parents, and teachers work together to find a graduation track that encourages students to take ownership of their learning.
- Teachers adapt the curriculum to fit student needs, so it meets students where they are at and guides them toward their learning goals.
- Faith principles are incorporated as part of values essential to the school community.
- Students help select extracurricular opportunities based on their goals and interests.

Traditional Education







- Academics are seen as an input function, automatically producing important outputs, regardless of how the individual personality, personal history, learning styles, or student needs affect the goals.
- Students are held accountable for learning important life skills even though school leaves it out of the curriculum.
- Students are expected to inherently understand how to succeed in the professional world. To follow technical and career tracks, they have to transfer out of rigorous academic courses.
- It is assumed that socio-emotional skills and mental health are good if the student is doing well in his or her studies.
- Leadership is a popularity contest rather than a skill that is developed and a position that is earned through trust.

- Academics are an effective avenue of learning for all students when combined with other aspects, such as character, life and professional skills, and socio-emotional health.
- The curriculum intentionally uses subject area topics to discuss and develop essential life skills, such as problem-solving, creativity, and communication.
- Career and technical skills are integrated into the high school curriculum so that academic development and professional skills are interdependent rather than disconnected.
- Socio-emotional skills and wellness are intentionally assessed and supported through school programs and trained experts.
- Leadership is trained, encouraged, and coached, preparing students to be successful when filling a leadership position.
